


Total enrollment increase, K-12, over three years

SCHOOL SNAPSHOTS


Over the last five years at St. Maximilian Kolbe Catholic School in Delano, preschool through sixth-grade enrollment has nearly doubled, which prompted conversations about reopening its middle school, said Principal Mary Ziebell. This academic year, St. Maximilian Kolbe added seventh grade with 12 students, and will add eighth grade in fall 2023, reinstating a full middle school, which the school hasn't had in nearly 50 years.

For the third year in a row, St. Croix Catholic School in Stillwater is anticipating enrollment growth of just over 10%. According to Principal Sister Maria Ivana, O.P., the preschool to eighth-grade school has become more intentional about sharing its story. "As an essential ministry of our parishes, we are about forming saints — young people who are on fire and are ready to change the world through the truth and love of Jesus Christ," Sister Maria Ivana said. "The unity between the school and its supporting parishes is all encompassing. Seeds are being sown, and the Lord is clearly blessing the work, seen by its fruit."

Preschool Enrollment




2022-23 Preschool Enrollment








2022-23 K-8 Enrollment



LEADERSHIP SUPPORT AND STRATEGIC PLANNING

This year, we honored our exceptional educators at the first Archdiocesan Catholic School Leadership Banquet.

The Archdiocese ramped up efforts to ensure that every Catholic school encountering a leadership transition has access to a high-quality search and selection process. The addition of a full-time Catholic School Recruitment Specialist also supports recruitment and talent identification.

The formal launch of the Archdiocesan Plan of Professional Development for all Catholic school leaders will encourage growth and strengthen skills. Through the Department of Catholic Schools, an Archdiocesan Orientation Program for new Catholic school leaders will provide resources to set them up for success. We will continue to identify stepping-stone roles for aspiring leaders and identifying future leaders.


BUCKING NATIONAL TRENDS

Teaching in a Catholic school is an invitation to share deeply in the Church's teaching ministry and experience the joy of helping students to grow into the person God created them to be.


While national news stories warned of a potential exodus of teachers from the educational sector in the 2021-22 academic year, as well as high turnover rates, the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis experienced a different story. Our Catholic schools experienced only a 13% turnover rate, largely ensuring consistency in personnel, a high-quality experience for students and satisfaction among families.











K-12 Head of School Highest Degree Attained



K-12 Head of School Years of Experience




K-8 Head of School Turnover













NOTES ON CATHOLIC SCHOOL STUDENTS

Since Catholic schools do not collect demographic data in the same way, the number of students who are Catholic; the number of students who qualify for free/reduced meals; and the number of students who are English Language Learners are likely higher than what is reported here.

NOTES ON CATHOLIC SCHOOL EMPLOYEES

K-12 Faculty: Employees whose primary responsibility is teaching. This includes classroom teachers and specialists.

K-12 School Leaders: Employees primarily responsible for the daily instructional leadership and managerial operations for the school.

K-12 Staff: Employees whose primary responsibility is focused on the support of faculty and school leaders.

Not all Catholic schools collect data on their employees in the same way. Number of employees who are Catholic and number of employees with advanced degrees are likely higher than what it reported here.

NOTES ON CATHOLIC PRESCHOOLS

Preschool students are grouped by their age as of September 1 in order to project their Kindergarten cohort. Four- and five-year-olds will likely be entering Kindergarten next year. The total number of preschool directors and staff includes only those individuals who are employed by the Catholic school or parish. It does not include employees of the independently-operated early learning programs leasing space in our Catholic school buildings. Catholic schools were not asked to report religious affiliation or degree level of employees serving preschool students.

NOTES ON OPERATING REVENUES AND OPERATING EXPENSES

All financial data is provided through a partnership with Catholic Finance Corporation for Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2022 (the most recent data available). The source of the financial data is from the accounting system of each individual school or parish. Although many schools use the same accounting software and chart of accounts, there still remain differences in accounting software, chart of accounts and accounting practices. Currently there is inconsistency in reporting accounting for donor restricted income and expense. This is due to software limitations, chart of account limitations and variation in accounting practices. There is current effort in addressing these differences and improving reporting for this activity. Catholic Finance works with each school in order to prepare school reports in a consistent manner. The school reports are useful for demonstrating trend, scope and magnitude. The percentages here represent the aggregate of the K-8 Catholic schools in the Archdiocese based on the individual school reports prepared by Catholic Finance.

NOTES ON TUITION AND FEES

Published Tuition: Highest stated tuition a school charges before applying any discounts and financial aid. *Mandatory Fees*: A flat-rate fee charged to all students in all grades in addition to tuition (e.g. enrollment/ re-enrollment fee; fundraising fee; technology fee) as reported by the school.

Each K-8 Catholic school has its own unique tuition, mandatory fee, and discount structure.

*The data on the Catholic School Financial Overview page includes all K-8 parochial and K-8 private Catholic schools in the Archdiocese. Private Catholic high schools and private K-12 Catholic schools were excluded from these figures. If a school charges different rates for students in middle school and elementary school, the two rates were averaged. Data on average cost to educate and average tuition collected comes from Catholic Finance Corporation for the 2021-22 fiscal year (the most recent available). All other data is from the 2022-23 Archdiocesan Schools Report as reported by each school.

When analyzing school financial data for the Archdiocese, averages may be calculated in one of two ways: 1) based upon aggregate totals; or 2) based on averages of the schools. For further information, please see the current year Vitality Index.

| Methodology

All data in this annual report comes from the Archdiocesan Schools Report (ASR) and the Archdiocesan Catechetical Report (ACR).

The ASR has been a vital fixture in data reporting for schools across the Archdiocesan and provides the quantitative basis for understanding demographics and financial trends and comparisons. In 2016, the ASR was revised significantly so that those who help provide for Catholic schools have access to meaningful and accurate data.

DEMOGRAPHIC AND FINANCIAL DATA

The 2022-23 ASR continues to separate the demographic portion from the financial portion. OMCE managed the demographic portion for the 2022-23 school year, and Catholic Finance Corporation (CFC) facilitated the collection and analysis of key financial indicators for our K-8 Catholic schools based on the fiscal year ending in June 2022. All demographic questions use a single date of October 1, 2022 for reporting purposes. Schools self-report all data, and OMCE followed up with over 10% of schools to confirm various data points. As in years past, we continue to have 100% participation.

PRESCHOOL DATA

The 2022 ASR continued to account for preschool students and the dedicated employees who serve them differently from K-12 students. While our strategic vision for Catholic schools looks at the totality of education from preschool through high schools, educational funding, policy, and law in the United States are based on a K-12 system, and so it is important to have data that aligns with our reporting requirements.

CATHOLIC SCHOOL EMPLOYEES

All employee counts are based on those who serve K-12 students and those who serve preschool. K-12 employees are divided according to their role as faculty (teaching positions), staff (positions primarily for the support of teachers or administrators) or school leaders (positions responsible for the instructional leadership and daily operations of the school).

PARISH CATECHESIS AND SACRAMENTAL PREPARATION

The ACR provides essential data on the landscape of parish catechesis and sacramental preparation across the Archdiocese. The 2022 ACR was completed by 153 parishes (83%) representing 136 parish catechetical programs due to combination or collaboration. Since not all parishes reported, some of the descriptive statistics (such as total enrollment) are projected rather than actual. However, unless otherwise noted, the data represents the 136 parish catechetical programs that participated in the ACR.

Data and Governance

Privacy Policy governing the Archdiocesan School and Catechetical Report

DEFINITIONS

"Data" is all information collected via the Archdiocesan School Report or the Archdiocesan Catechetical Report. "School" is a Catholic school within the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis.

PRIVACY STATEMENT

Representing the Archbishop of Saint Paul and Minneapolis, the Office for the Mission of Catholic Education (OMCE) serves the Catholic schools in the Archdiocese. Schools and catechetical programs are required to accurately disclose requested information to OMCE. In turn, the Catholic schools and parish catechetical programs within the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis have the right to know how this data will be used and who will have access to it.

INFORMATION OWNERSHIP

OMCE is the administrator of the ASR and ACR and owner of the data collected on schools and parish catechetical programs.

INFORMATION PURPOSE

Data is used by OMCE in order to advance the mission of Catholic education in the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis. Examples of data use include, but are not limited to, planning purposes, public relations, funding, and internal archdiocesan decision making.

INFORMATION ACCESS

Data is considered private. OMCE, archdiocesan directors, and bishops have access to the data on each individual school. Information processors have access to the raw data yet have no authority to share or distribute the data. Data on individual schools will be shared with the National Catholic Education Association, the Minnesota Catholic Council, and any other organization, foundation, or benefactor authorized by OMCE or the bishops in order to advance the mission of Catholic education in the Archdiocese. Data on an individual schools that is already publicly available, such as total enrollment and the name of the principal, may also be shared publicly. With the written authorization of the principal or pastor, administrators of individual schools may request to see the data of their particular school.


